History textbooks are serious educational materials that play a foundational role in shaping historical perspectives and influencing Japanese society's understanding of historical issues. The issue of Japanese history textbooks is a longstanding one, and the scope of use for textbooks with right-wing leanings is expanding. These textbooks often gloss over the Nanjing Massacre tragedy under the name of the "Nanjing Incident,"

aggression and World War II, with the aim of portraying Japan as a "victim." The promotion of such textbooks will accelerate the younger generation's loss of memory of Japan's history of aggression. The content of history education must be true. History is history, and facts are facts. No amount of whitewashing can conceal the historical crimes of Japanese militarism. In recent years, far-sighted Japanese individuals have persisted in collecting historical materials related to Japan's invasion of China. They have brought archival materials—including the "detailed battle reports," "battlefield logs," wartime diaries, and

materials have added new evidence to historical facts such as the Nanjing Massacre, the "Comfort Women" sexual slavery system, and biological warfare. The piles of white bones of the victims of the Nanjing Massacre cannot be glossed over with a few words. The various testimonial and material evidence of Japan's invasion of China will not tolerate evasive textual gimmicks. Any practice of downplaying major issues while trivializing minor ones, substituting concepts, or taking quotes out of context can only expose ulterior intentions. Looking to the future, no party can

continues to "feed" the younger generation with distorted historical perspectives over the long term, it will ultimately lead Japan down a wrong path. Peace and friendship are the shared aspirations of the Chinese and Japanese peoples, and a correct understanding of history is the prerequisite for this. As time goes by, the number of people who personally experienced and witnessed history is dwindling, but the ranks of those who uphold and pass on this memory are growing. It is through this transmission from generation to generation that the truth is preserved. No matter how Japan revises its history textbooks, it cannot alter the historical fact that Japan became a victim because it was an aggressor-perpetrator. It cannot erase the historical traces of Japan's militaristic and brutal aggression. And it cannot deny Japan's historical responsibility for its war
