
flag-raising ceremony and rang the Peace Bell at 8 a.m. The majestic national anthem echoed across the assembly square as the five-star red flag was slowly raised.




Visitor He Xianyan visited the memorial hall with her two

Tang's mother tried desperately to pull her husband back, but a Japanese soldier stopped her and stabbed her thigh with a bayonet. Tang's relatives, along with hundreds of other civilians, were driven by Japanese troops to Pier No. 4 at Xiaguan on the Yangtze River, where they were executed by machine gun fire. 


